On Wednesday, the Bishop went over to Kawaihae-uka; several bap-tisms and 9 confirmations; here the mountain cold and brisk rain had brought down the heat of festivities, and we all were glad to have a little rest and to be spared off the afflu-ence of Kohala. On Thursday, several children were baptized at Waimea and confirmation was given to 15 people; but here again we were bound to recommence the trial. A grand luau was served a la kanaka; a success for that good people. The church had been finely decorated and three arches erected in the yard, with the inscription: "Aloha

ka Makua.' But we must go to Hamakua. Thanks to all of you, without special mention, and may God bless you all and give you a thousand in return. Aloha oukou a nui loa, e o'u

poe keiki: ua hala e, ka Makua nui Kulekana. A ike hou ia! The main effect of the Bishop's first pastoral visit to Kohala was principally a good many baptisms, 257 confirmations and the blessing of the new chapel at Mahukona His Lordship sincerely regrets that he could not repay visits; time was too short. Voluntary contributions amounting to \$99.45 covered all expenses, leaving a balance of \$13.30 for the church. ALOHA OUROU.

Halawa, April 27, 1893. Right Rev. Gulstan, in making his pastoral tour around Hawaii, everywhere meets with warm and enthusiastic receptions. In Waipio especially, where His Lordship had spent the first fifteen years of his missionary life, and where he had always been loved and venerated as a good and tender Father, he was received with genuine childlike affection. The same Christians that received him as an ordinary ecclesiastic twenty-five years ago, now welcomed him to Waipio as their Bishop, and vied with each other in paying to him their respects as the head of the

Church in Hawaii. It was a touching spectacle indeed to behold those good-natured inhabitants of Waipio valley gathering around their beloved pastor, father and friend, with eyes moistened with affection, and altogether melting into tears when the Bishop, in his usual gentle manner, responded to their loving address of welcome. They wanted to carry him upon their shoulders, a handsome chair having been provided for the occasion, but this honor the humble Bishop respectfully declined. At Honokaa the Bishop was warmly received and magnifi-cently entertained by his old friends, Messrs. Hardy and Delanux. The number of confirmations at Honokaa amounted to 218, and at Kukaiau, 124. At Ookala, in the Hilo district, His Lordship was the guest of Mr. Walker. On the evening of his arrival at that place, he received a deputation of Portuguese requesting him to preach a sermon that very night, as they could not come to church the next day. The Bishop consented, and at the late hour of 10 p. m. gave them a long and eloquent sermon with which they were highly delighted. High mass was celebrated the next day and 49 perons were confirmed.

At Laupahoehoe His Lordship was received by Mr. and Mrs. McLennan. Ffty-three persons were confirmed. The Bishop's reception in Honomu was grand. The church was tastefully decorated, Japanese and Chinese lanterns giving it and the pastor's residence the appearance of a fairy palace. Arches were creeted in different places and flags were floating everywhere to the breeze. Messrs. Scholtze, Kinney, Andrews, Flohr, Malterre and others did all they could to make the Bishop's stay in Honomu a pleasant one. The congregational singing of Honomu was particularly fine. The number of confirmations amounted to 153. In the afternoon of the same day the Bishop confirmed 190 persons at Kalana, seven miles from Honomu, and arrived in Hilo the same evening, April 23, at 6 p. m., to take a few days of rest before proceeding farther on his pastoral tour through Puna, Kau and Kona.
