The S. S. Doric arrived yesterday afternoon, 6 days and 14 hours from San Francisco. She sailed about 2 o'clock this afternoon for the Orient. She brought some 30 tourists and carries forward a number of sailors for Dewey's fleet.

David P. Nahale and Miss Julia Kauka were married at St. Andrew's Cathedral last evening. Rev. A. Mackintosh officiated, and Wray Taylor presided at the organ. A reception was held at the residence of Hon. W. C. Acbi.

Lewis, a sailor on a bark in the harbor, was charged before Judge Wilcox this morning with assaulting the stewardess on the vessel. He pleaded guilty and received a severe lecture, in which the learned magistrate called him everything nice in a polite way, and was made to pay a fine of \$10 and costs.

MORE FIGHTING TAKES PLACE IN THE SOUDAN

Egyptian Forces Reported to Have Been Defeated and the Tenth Battalion Destroyed.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The Morning Leader publishes the following dispatches from Cairo: "Rumors are in circulation here that on December 23th, the Dervishes under Emir Fedil, on the Blue Nile, defeated the Egyptian forces, the Tenth Soudanese Battalion being entirely destroyed. It is reported that reinforcements are being hurried to the scene and that another battle is imminent."
(This news is not credited by other influential and well informed journals.)

According to a dispatch from Cairo on January 5th, Colonel Lewis with a Soudanese regiment and a detachment of irregular troops attacked Fedil, the last remaining formidable Dervish chief, while he was crossing the Blue Nile on December 26th, at the cataract south of Roseiro, storming the island on which Fedil took up his position and capturing 1590 Dervishes. Fedil, however, escaped with 300 followers.

A Leviathan Launched.

BELFAST, Jan. 14.—The White Star steamer Oceanic, the largest steamer ever built, was successfully launched at Harland & Wolff's yard today in the presence of an enormous crowd.

The Oceanic, unlike the Great Eastern, which was launched broadside, was launched stern foremost, though longer and weighing half as much again as the Great Eastern.

The vessel is 704 feet long and her gross tonnage is 17,000. To walk from her bow to her stern and back again means a stroll of 500 yards, so that any one accomplishing this trip three times will have nearly covered a mile. She will have only three light pole masts, as sail power is useless in a vessel of this class. Every appliance known to modern engineering has been introduced into this enormous steel ship.

Transports for Manila.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The arrival of the Ohio at San Francisco today has relieved the minds of the officials of the Quartermaster's Department as to the exact constitution of the next expedition from the western coast for Manila. There are four ships which will make up this fleet. The Scandia will be the flagship, and the Senator, the Ohio and the Morgan City will be the other vessels which will sail in company with that vessel. There will be two regiments of regulars, which will be taken by the Scandia, Senator and Ohio, while the Morgan City will carry supplies. These ships will be sent away early next month if they are not made ready before the end of the present month.
